Schwab's WEF instructs governments to ban private car ownership as soon as possible

According to Klaus Schwab's World Economic Forum, people should no longer own private cars. You should also do without your own smartphones if possible. Using instead of owning. This is intended to reduce the alleged effects on climate change.

The unspeakable Green Agenda 2030 of the World Economic Forum (WEF) should now also affect the owners of their own motor vehicles. Not only should combustion engines be banned as quickly as possible – people should also give up their private vehicles as quickly as possible. in one new item it says in the introduction: "We need a clean energy revolution and we need it now." "Be honest," continues the WEF, "you probably have at least one old cellphone sitting in a drawer. Possibly also an unused hard drive that is taking up space. You are not alone. The average car or van in England is only driven 4 percent of the time... This is anything but resource efficient. More sharing can reduce ownership of idle devices and thus material consumption. Car-sharing platforms like Getaround and BlueSG have already seized this opportunity and are offering vehicles that pay per hour."

The WEF adds that not only should people give up ownership of everything from cars to smartphones, but that technologies and civilization must be redesigned to facilitate this transition: "To enable a broader transition from ownership to use, the way we design things and systems must also change... A design process that focuses on meeting underlying needs, rather than product

purchase, is for this Transition fundamental. This mindset is required for redesigning cities to reduce private transport and other forms of use." What is the future motto of the World Economic Forum? Right: **"You will have nothing, but you will be happy."** But if only some corporations and the states own everything (from cars to houses) and we only use things – then who owns the companies and corporations? Will all the billionaires also give up their yachts and private jets? What about their huge fleets? Will these spoiled "elites" also give up all their possessions, or, like in the communist countries of the Eastern Bloc, will they proceed according to the motto "All people are equal, but some people are more equal"?

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
